## **CHAMBERS**

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Our first words upon meeting a friend, business associate, or family are usually directed to their health. Hello – how are you? Bonjour, comment allez vous, Buongiorno – comme sta? It's the same in all languages and the reply is a casual – very well thanks – tres bien, merci, and so on.

Our health is a major concern to all and down through the ages in the medical world wine has always had a position of importance but always with the advice to be consumed in moderation.

Hippocrates and St Paul knew little of the scientific reasons why wine should be so good, but they, and many others, wrote of the benefits of a "little wine for thy stomach's sake." Louis Pasteur looked at wine in a slightly different light, calling it "the most healthful and hygienic of beverages."

In the 1920's Professor Hugh Maclean M.D. Sc (occupant of the Chair of Medicine at the University of London) wrote in an article to a Melbourne paper "Sometimes when a stomach is not doing its work well, the effect of alcohol tending to increase gastric secretions may be useful" and Dr Robert Hutchinson, Physician to the London Hospital said "The red wines, such as Burgundy and Port, are believed to be especially possessed of "tonic properties." A publication of the 150th Anniversary of the Wine Industry of Australia (1938) quoted Dr Thomas Fiaschi "Wine is for people in good health a means to keep in excellent health, and for sick people a means to regain health.'

We are told Chinese medicos used wine to treat heart disease 5,000 years ago, but only recently has scientific research found the association between vascular disease and wine consumption

Dr Geoffrey Skurray at the Centre for Advanced Food Research, University of Western Sydney, has compiled the following interesting findings from around the world on the advantages of moderate wine consumption. Medical researchers suggested that in view of the cardio-protective properties of wine and the new evidence for preventing dementia, elderly people

should not give up drinking wine in moderation. Dr Ovisesan, Howard University hospital Washington, studied the eyes of over 3,000 adults aged 45 to 74 years. The incidence of age-related macular damage was 40% lower in those who regularly drank wine for more than 10 years. Suggested the antioxidants helped prevent the disease.

Despite the high fat diet of the French they have a low incidence of coronary heart disease, and research in California and the Netherlands has shown drinking wine, and to a lesser extent, beer, reduces the oxidation of low density lipoproteins that deposit cholesterol in the coronary arteries, but also dilate the blood vessels and prevent clots from blocking arteries by inhibiting platelet aggregation.

Medicos at St Vincent's hospital Sydney, carried out a 6 year study of 1,236 men and 1,569 women in Dubbo and found the deaths mainly from heart disease were reduced 25% by people drinking 1 to 7 drinks per week, 32% for 15 to 28 drinks per week, and 51% for 28+ drinks per week. A large number of these people drank beer as well as wine.

Dr Middleton in Maine, USA studied the effects of wine on the human body and found that the antioxidant present has an anti-allergic, antiinflammatory, anti-viral and antioxidant activity.

They stimulate the activities of most cells, platelets, smooth muscle cells and certain flavonoids possess powerful anticancer activity. In 1998 Drs Tavani and Ferrarani in Italy reported six clinics indicated wine drinkers had a lower incidence of colon and rectal cancer. Resveratrol found in wine also shows some effect in slowing the growth of liver cancer.

In view of the new research that has found remarkable health promoting properties in wine,

it is suggested more research must go into viticultural and winemaking practices to ensure these properties are not destroyed.

Professor Skurray suggests the moderate consumption of 2 or 3 glasses of wine per day for the prevention of degenerative diseases may be better, and cheaper, than any known drug.

#### Did you hear about...

A 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> year old Golden Labrador called Tomi, (even though she's a girl) from Lawson Dry Hills Wines in Blenheim, New Zealand, who is able to detect when grapes are ready to pick? "The first time I realised she was eating them was when I realised there were whole rows for three or four bays without a bloody grape on them. She had been getting underneath the netting and eating them" said her master, Ross Lawson said. Tomi is very clever and very chubby!

Another Kiwi hound called Brix because he was built like a brick outhouse, spits out grapes which have not reached the required level of sweetness or, in wine making terms, the residual sugar. In Australia we mainly use Beaume to measure this sweetness whereas in New Zealand and a few other countries around the world Brix is the system used.

#### Wine Profile: Shiraz

There is some question as to where this exotic sounding red grape variety originated. Some believe it derived its name from an area in Iran, while others believe it originated in the Rhone Valley, France, where the name Syrah is used.

Grown extensively in Australia, it has, in the past, been referred to as Hermitage, and is often blended with other red varieties. Back in the 1980's, growers were encouraged to pull this variety out to avoid over supply. Thankfully, Rosewood's vines are still thriving with many planted more than 40 years ago and some over 90 years old.

The fruit grows in elongated bunches with small to medium oval shaped berries which tend to go droopy when ripe, making hand picking the most efficient method of harvesting.

Warmer regions such as Rutherglen and McLaren Vale produce quite powerful Shiraz wines. The cooler ripening seasons of Coonawarra and most other Victorian wine regions however provide softer, more subtle wines due to the longer ripening times.

At Chambers, Shiraz is at times blended with other red varieties such as Cabernet Sauvignon, Blue Imperial and Touriga to enhance the characteristics of each variety. Some of the ports such as Mt Carmel, Vintage and Ruby also include Shiraz.

Langton's Classification of Australian Wines ranks Shiraz and Shiraz blends in 26 of the top 60 places on its register. With world-renowned wines such as Penfold's Grange and Henschke's Hill of Grace sharing its mantle, it is no wonder that Shiraz is Australia's leading variety.

### 2002 Vintage Report

As with the rest of South Eastern Australia, summer in Rutherglen was cooler than average. However, unlike some other grape growing regions, the temperatures attained during the summer months were adequate for flowering, veraison (bud burst) and grape ripening.

Vintage kicked off on 11th February with the grapes for the Light Muscat being picked, (though I must admit some of the pickers were keen to start before this date). Unlike 2001 where there was some breathing space between the finish of the white harvest and the commencement of the reds etc., this year every variety wanted to come in at once. So, it was flat strap from the start of picking to the finish on Anzac day. Total yield for 2002 was 170 tonnes.

Even though it was hectic in both the cellar and vineyard, the resultant wines were still given their usual care and attention. The grapes were hand picked by our team of trusty locals. Crushed and de-stemmed, (in our newly altered crushing area and yes, the mono pump did manage to pump the Muscat and Tokay as well as the odd stick) then either straight into the press (whites and Tokay) or into fermenting tanks (the rest). Part way through vintage my cellar hand, Duncan Welsh, decided that Rugby League was more exciting than working in the cellar and Grant Sawyer took over and has fitted in very well. Bill did come in and give a hand as well as the odd piece of advice like "lets do 3 loads tomorrow." I, myself just ran around in ever decreasing circles hoping that everything would work out.

The resultant wines are comparing favourably to those of last year but only time will tell.
